FOXP2

With this exhibition, titled FOXP2, Marguerite Humeau set herself an impossible challenge: to artificially re-create the emergence of sentient life. Conceived as a biological showroom, the presentation suggests the possibility that consciousness might now be reproducible on an industrial scale. It displays prototypes of living beings with different degrees of sentience.

98% of human and chimpanzee DNA is the same. According to the scientist Jared Diamond, in his book The Third Chimpanzee, the crucial 2% difference lies in the mutation of a gene called FOXP2. This event was responsible for the evolution of the vocal tract, which generated a dramatic change in the larynx structure around 100,000 years ago. Noam Chomsky has called this a "single-chance mutation", an accident of evolution that allowed our ancestors to produce the first forms of an articulate language.

Humeau consulted linguists all over the world to re-enact the moment when this mutation occurred. Reverse-engineering processes have been used to create a sound piece, while a speculated proto-language was created in collaboration with Pierre Lanchantin from the Laboratory of Voice Synthesis at the University of Cambridge. A voice has been synthesised to beatbox. It joins a "celestial chorus" composed of everyone to have lived on planet Earth, since the very first tribes 100,000 years ago - 108 billion voices in total.

For FOXP2, Humeau contacted a number of zoologists, palaeontologists, biologists and psychologists, and asked them to imagine what might have been the biological evolution of elephants if, instead of humans, they had become sentient beings able to use language. The death throes of a matriarch elephant lie at the heart of the exhibition. Her slow passage towards death triggers the evolution of others in the group, which

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have been programmed to display a wide variety of feelings and states: sadness, melancholy, drunkenness, nostalgia, joy, love or amazement.

On each platform lies a pink carpet, dyed with pigments created from chemical components of the human body, along with patches of a purple pigment concocted using Datura, a toxic plant whose berry is suspected of being the forbidden fruit in Genesis. Reduced to a liquid state, humanity becomes a "soulless body", on which other sentient beings evolve.

JEAN, An elephant watching the scene with a sense of wonder

 FELICIE, A female engineered to be self-destructive - getting drunk with ethanol that comes from a masala fruit

Polystyrene, white paint, acrylic parts, latex, silicone, glass artificial masala fruit, ethanol water pumps, water, nylon, powder-coated metal stand, sound

 EMMETT, A male in artificial oestrus showing highly visible signs of aggressivity

Polystyrene, white paint, acrylic parts, latex, silicone, glass container, artificial black must, water pumps, water, nylon, powder-coated metal stand, sound

BASTIEN, A foetus is being born

Polystyrene, white paint, acrylic parts, latex, silicone, nylon, sound

PIERRE, An elephant engineered to be happy

Polystyrene, white paint, a crylic parts, latex, silicone, nylon, endorphin powder, powder-coated metal stand, sound

BODY WITHOUT SOUL, Liquid Human.

Carpet dyed with: 2.2g Datura, Liquid Human Body (65% Oxygen, 18% Carbon, 10% Hydrogen, 3% Nitrogen, 1.5% Calcium, 1% Phosphore, 0.4% Potassium, 0.3% Sulfur, 0.23% Iode, 0.2% Sodium, 0.2% Chlorine, 0.08% Iron, 0.033% Magnesium, 0.02% Molybdenum, 0.009% Silicon, 0.0027% Zinc, Traces of Fluoride, Cobalt, Strontium, Copper, Lithium, Manganese, Selenium, Aluminium, Lead, Vanadium, Arsenic, Bromine)
