Allan Weber (b.1992, Brazil) is a multi-disciplinary artist working across a range of mediums including assemblage, installation, sculpture and photography.

Weber's practice acts as a vehicle to deconstruct the realities of daily life within the favelas (self-built informal settlements) of Rio de Janeiro where he lives and works. He adopts geometric abstraction and formal qualities from the Brazilian Neo-Concrete art movement and fuses them with sharp socio-political commentary and an intuitive approach to making. My Order is the artist's first institutional solo exhibition, bringing together previous interests in material and visual representations of his life and community in Cinco Bocas (a favela in the North of Rio de Janeiro) alongside newly commissioned works created in response to his time spent in the UK. The title has multiple reference points, nodding to Weber's artistic and social forms of living and working within the laws of the favela; his time working as a food delivery rider receiving customers' 'orders'; and his upbringing in a Christian Evangelical Pentecostal household where the supreme order followed was that of God.

Weber's practice reflects the social dynamics of his community, using motifs and codes that shape his world. In 2020, he founded Galeria 5 Bocas, a barbershop-turned-gallery with an associated football club Cinco Bocas FC, to support local artists and inspire youth through art and football, offering alternatives to unemployment and crime.

Gallery 1 introduces audiences to Weber's burgeoning practice since 2020, repurposing everyday objects to transform their function and infuse them with new meaning, with his compositions connecting favela culture with wider Brazilian art history. Photographs honour Weber's neighborhood and Cinco Bocas FC and the connection between art and football as vehicles for social mobility and community. His football jerseys feature verses, biblical extracts, proverbs, and aphorisms, blending poetry and visual art. A collaboration with Nottingham based clothing brand Art of Football expands this dialogue, resulting in a codesigned football scarf (available for visitors to purchase) that reflects their shared grassroots and community- focused values.

Gallery 2 features newly commissioned works made in response to a residency in Nottingham in 2024, furthering Weber's social practice and interrogation of economic systems and structures. Drawing on notions of value, informal economies of invisible labour and the circulation of goods, the presentation looks to Weber's work embedding himself as a food delivery rider, both in Rio de Janeiro and Nottingham. For Weber, his informal approach to integrating and communing within a new place 'is the work'. During his residency, a local barbershop, Arabian Barber, and Brazilian market and café, Made in Brazil, were important meeting places for Weber to socialise and become familiar with the city. A new artwork has been installed in Arabian Barber in reference to these interactions.
