## **Allan Weber at Nottingham Contemporary**

Nottingham Contemporary is excited to present the first institutional solo exhibition of Allan Weber. The exhibition will feature existing works, alongside ambitious new site-specific commissions and has been co-curated by Pablo León de la Barra, Curator at Large, Latin America at the Solomon R. Guggegnheim Museum and Foundation.

Weber is a multi-disciplinary artist born in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil (1992), where he currently works and resides. Working across a range of mediums including assemblage, installation, sculpture and photography, Weber's practice acts as a vehicle to deconstruct the realities of daily life within the favelas of Rio de Janeiro.

His work incorporates material and visual elements he views as synonymous with life in the favelas. This includes tarps used at funk parties, common architectural features such as water tanks, razor blades used to create popular hairstyles, as well as elements that relate to the work life of those active in phone app bicycle and motorcycle food delivery. Questioning the traditions and legacy of Brazilian Constructivism, Weber appropriates these elements into compositions that transform their social meaning.





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During a month-long residency in Nottingham, Weber has immersed himself in the food delivery network in the city, capturing daily deliveries on discarded 35mm point and shoot cameras and video footage shot by friends. This process of connecting to this community relies on the informal exchanges and associations he has made, furthering Weber's social practice and his interrogation of economic systems and structures. Social negotiations play an important role in Weber's work, and in 2020 he established the Galeria 5 Bocas in Rio de Janeiro. The gallery looks to platform the work of local artists, generate economies for them and inspire young people through encounters with art. The creation of the gallery's own youth football team and art project, Cinco Bocas FC, provides an alternative route out of crime and violence for young people in the neighbourhood. This relationship between art and football as vehicles for social mobility is being explored during Weber's residency in Nottingham.
