Feels Strangely Good, Ya? is the first international institutional solo exhibition of the late Balinese artist I Gusti Ayu Kadek Murniasih (1966–2006, Bali), more commonly known as 'Murni'. Spanning two galleries, the exhibition is a celebration of Murni's acutely personal works which emerge as an exploration of her subconscious, dreams and psyche.

Largely self-taught, Murni gained recognition in the 1990s for her striking depictions of female sexuality in a body of work that addresses themes of pleasure, sex, power dynamics, trauma and desire with humour, absurdity and unflinching honesty. Her unapologetically raw paintings are grounded in her experiences and daily life, and they challenged taboos around expressions of sexual desire by speaking to the unruly complexity of the female body. Unconventional by nature, her work resisted the dominant societal,

cultural and political norms of Indonesia and Bali.

The exhibition presents seminal works created across the artist's lifetime, many of which feature ambiguous hybrid figures - part human and part animal - as well as interspecies relationships that exist beyond the realms of human-made moral codes. The direct and unique nature of her visual language - playful, confessional and stripped of inhibitions – led to both acclaim and marginalisation within the growing contemporary Balinese art world.

The exhibition also embraces the companionship, creative freedom and overlapping themes she found amongst a small group of fellow artists including Edmondo Zanolini 'Mondo' (b. 1951), I Dewa Putu Mokoh 'Mokoh' (c. 1936–2010) and Oototol, born Dewa Raram 'Totol' (c. 1930–2008) with a selection of their works in Gallery 1.

Feels Strangely Good, Ya? marks an important step in championing Murni's legacy to audiences globally. It is an invitation for viewers to find pleasure in the surreal, to sit within the strange, the

uncomfortable and the ecstatic and to trust and be guided by the senses.
