

Chico da Silva

*And the soul is for the birds*

06.06 – 06.09.26

Francisco Domingos da Silva, or simply Chico da Silva, (Cruzeiro do Sul - Alto Tejo, Acre, 1922/3\* - Fortaleza, Ceará, 1985) was a formidable artist and important figure within the history of Latin American art. Da Silva remains a figure who is impossible to overlook. His work is shaped by a distinctive pictorial imagination that complicates questions of authorship, value and the hierarchies of art production – both for the distinctiveness of his practice and for the ways it has been historically framed,

circulated and contested within and beyond Brazil.

Da Silva's legacy resonates in contemporary debates through efforts to deconstruct the colonial violence and erasure of insurgencies that did not, or do not, conform to the Western modern tradition. For this reason, more than ever, it is essential to direct our attention to his vast artistic production, which began in the early 1940s and continued until close to his death in 1985. From a continental country such as Brazil, the artist portrayed in his lifetime a mirror of the cultural and environmental diversity of this territory.

The son of a mother from Ceará, who migrated to the state of Acre in search of work during the rubber extraction economic boom, and of an Indigenous father from the far western Amazon of Peruvian origin, Chico da Silva was born and lived in an Indigenous community in Alto Tejo (Acre), later migrating with his family to the state of Ceará in 1934. In the early 1940s, in a context of total adversity, this unique figure in Brazilian history began to poetically intervene, drawing on the walls of the city of Fortaleza, onto sheets of paper, and onto canvases of fabric and wood.

In broad terms, it can be said that his practice condenses and synthesises two powerful imaginaries of Brazil's environmental and cultural reality: the vast symbolic world of the Amazon and Indigenous culture; and the equally powerful environment of the country's coastal life, from fishing culture to the urban culture of the Northeast coast. This may be one of the central keys to understanding his repertoire, of lived experiences and dreams translated onto two-dimensional surfaces. Between co-existence and tension, within the field of his canvases, Da

Silva's fantastical animals come to life.

It is from the communion of these worlds that the exhibition unfolds. From the outset, the presence of a singular spectrum of colours is evident in the body of works now on display, along with the richness of the reinterpretations of local fauna and flora. At the same time, his work is not merely an idyllic and fantastical version of what emerges from this continental landscape, it is also a reflection of forms of popular knowledge, often erased, and of a poetics of dream and delirium that responds to the harshness of everyday life.

\*The artist's date of birth is not precisely known and is widely circulated as 1910. Given the precarious nature of record-keeping in early twentieth-century Brazil, together with the adverse conditions of his life, it is unfortunately not possible to determine the exact date with certainty. In recent years, however, based on cross-referenced data and interviews given by the artist, it has been established that the widely circulated 1910 date does not align with the findings of researchers.
