

Dala Nasser

Cemetery of Martyrs

Dala Nasser (b. 1990, Lebanon) works across painting, sculpture, and sound to create installations shaped by the ancient cultures, landscapes, and geologies of southern Lebanon and wider West Asia. For her new work, Cemetery of Martyrs, she transforms the exhibition space into a symbolic graveyard - a collective site of mourning, remembrance, and reflection.

Using frottage, the technique of taking rubbings from textured surfaces, Nasser has gathered charcoal impressions from the graves of influential artists, writers, poets, filmmakers, historians, and journalists across Lebanon, Egypt, Jordan, and England. Each rubbing commemorates a cultural figure from the Arab Renaissance (Nahda) in the mid-nineteenth century to the present whose work and ideas resisted political

domination and occupation. Among these figures are Palestinian author Ghassan Kanafani, feminist writer May Ziadeh, painters such as Etel Adnan and Juliana Seraphim, and the assassinated cartoonist Naji al-Ali. Though separated by geography and eras, they are brought together in this new memorial site.

Cyanotypes represent those whose graves are unreachable or unknown, extending the memorial to voices otherwise lost. These sit alongside black mourning fabrics that hang over a wooden trellis, forming a canopy that visitors move beneath. An accompanying sound installation bridges the realms of the living and the dead, deepening the sense of communion across time.

Nasser's installation constructs a shared space in which the legacies of these cultural figures can be gathered, protected, and felt. Their work - spanning literature, art, and political thought - has been seminal in shaping understandings of sovereignty and self-determination in West Asia. Cemetery of Martyrs

counters colonial and Eurocentric frameworks that have obscured or erased these histories, offering instead a place in which buried stories may re-emerge. In seeking to mend what history has left undone, the work is a place to mourn, learn, and reaffirm the power of culture and humanity to connect us to histories of resistance and renewal, finding hope in the past to forge new pathways of thought and action for the future.
