There is a direct threat to staff health and wellbeing from transmission of the COVID-19 coronavirus while at work People can catch the virus from others who are infected in the following ways:

- Virus moves from person-to-person in droplets from the nose or mouth spread when a person with the virus coughs or exhales
- The virus can survive for up to 72 hours out of the body on surfaces which people have coughed on, etc
- People can pick up the virus by breathing in the droplets or by touching contaminated surfaces and then touching their eyes or mouth

This risk assessment has been subject to, and revised in light of, consultation with Nottingham Contemporary's Employee Forum. A further draft was circulated to all staff prior to reopening for further feedback and improvement.

The control measures below apply from Monday 19 July 2021.

Equality accessibility impacts: Impacts on accessibility and equality in this risk assessment remain under ongoing review.

We will:

- Ensure hand sanitisers and other protective equipment are accessible from a wheelchair throughout
- Ensure health and safety signage is readable from a wheelchair, at a large point size and is dyslexia friendly
- Ensure health and safety signage is available in the most widely used languages in Nottingham and the East Midlands (English, Gujarati, Polish, Punjabi, Urdu, Cantonese) and uses widely recognised symbols wherever possible
- Ensure our health and safety guidance is communicated and made accessible for blind and d/Deaf visitors
- Ensure hand sanitisers and other protective equipment are accessible for blind visitors
- Train staff on removing their face coverings in interactions with d/Deaf visitors who lip-read and with other visitors who require sight of the full face (transparent visors will be provided to staff to support safe communication)
- Train staff on welcoming visitors who are exempt from face coverings
- Develop digital and off-site programmes and resources to serve and engage communities and visitors while events remain on hold
- Evidence suggests that COVID-19 has a significantly disproportionate impact on people from Black African, Black Caribbean or South Asian heritage. One of the recommendations advised by the Public Health England report into the 'Disparities in the risk and outcomes of COVID-19' is the development of risk assessments for workers with Black African, Black Caribbean or South Asian heritage in roles where they are exposed to a large section of the general public. Nottingham Contemporary has assessed risks and implemented safety measures to mitigate the risk of COVID-19 infection to vulnerable staff and visitors. We will continue to review these risks and measures against official guidance.
